

MLA Citation Guide

FYI...

- Source citations are listed in ABC order at the end of your paper, project, etc.
- Title your list of sources as Works Cited centered at the top of the first page with no quotation marks, underlining, or italicizing.
- Sources are **double-spaced** within and between entries. Each entry has a hanging indent.
- Include URLs in the citation. Omit "http://" or "https://"

"If I "just know" a fact or idea (something I learned in high school, for example), do I have to cite my high school course or textbook?"

This question falls under the issue of common knowledge. Common knowledge generally includes biographical information, dates of historical events, and other undisputed, widely available information. If you think that your average, reasonable reader already accepts this information as fact, it is not necessary to document it." ~ Purdue OWL

<i>Type of Source</i>	<i>Citation</i>
<i>book by a single author</i>	Last Name, First Name. <i>Title of Book</i> . Publisher, Publication Date. Example - Smith, Joe. <i>England's Kings and Queens</i> . Notre Dame UP, 2001.
<i>book by two or more authors</i>	Last Name, First Name, and First name Last name. <i>Title of Book</i> . Publisher, Publication Date. Example - Smith, Joe C., and D. C. Alley. <i>The Sky at Night</i> . U of Chattanooga P, 2012. Note: List the names in the same order as on the title page, not necessarily in alphabetical order.
<i>website with an author</i>	Author's last name, first name. "Title of article or webpage." <i>Title of website</i> , Name of the publisher, Date of publication, URL. Accessed date.
<i>website without an author</i>	"Title of article or webpage." <i>Title of website</i> , Name of Publisher, Date of publication, URL. Accessed date.
<i>journal article from library database</i>	Author's last name, first name. "Title of article." <i>Title of journal</i> , First name Last name of any other contributors (if applicable), Numbers (such as a volume or issue number), Publication date, Page numbers. <i>Title of the database</i> , URL or DOI. Accessed date is optional.
<i>article in a monthly magazine</i>	Author's last name, first name. "Title of article." <i>Title of magazine</i> . Date of magazine month year, page range.
<i>article in a newspaper</i>	Author's last name, first name. "Title of article." <i>Title of the newspaper</i> , Date of publication, Location. Example - Smith, Robert. "Election Results Confirmed." <i>United States Press</i> , 21 May 2017, p. B3.
<i>online/Youtube video</i>	Author's last name, first name. "Title of video." <i>Youtube</i> , uploaded by _____, date uploaded day, month, year, URL.
<i>online/Youtube video - no author</i>	"Title of video." <i>Youtube</i> , uploaded by _____, date uploaded day, month, year, URL. "If the author is the same as the uploader, only cite the author once. If the author is different from the uploader, cite the author's name before the title." -Purdue Owl

Citation

The Bible. Version, Publisher, Publication Date.

Example: *The Bible*. The New American Bible, American Bible Society, 1991.

For in-text citations for *The Bible*, cite the version in italics (as each translation varies) followed by the book, chapter, and verse. Example - (*New American Bible*, Genesis 1.1-15).

"Title of digital image." *Title of website*, First name last name of any contributors, Version (if applicable), Number (if applicable), Publisher, Publication date, URL.

Creator's last name, first name. "Title of digital image." *Title of website*, First name last name of any contributors, Version (if applicable), Number (if applicable), Publisher, Publication date, URL.
